From the Pastor's Desk

"This people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines." (Mark 7: 6-7) There was a monastery where lived a monk with his disciples. Once a cat lost its way and came into the monastery. The monk and disciples took care of it. So, it became accustomed to the place and, therefore, never left. Whenever the monk and his disciples would do their meditation and prayer, the cat would come and sit either in the monk's lap or climb on to his head or shoulder, causing distraction and disturbance in their meditation. So, the monk ordered that the cat be tied to a pole during their prayer. Over time, it became a routine that the cat was tied up before they began their meditation. Years later, when the monk died, tying up the cat continued during their meditation sessions. In time, the practice became a ritual and, when the cat eventually died, another cat was brought to the monastery to be tied up before their meditation. Over decades, it had become a tradition that the monk would begin meditations only after the cat had been tied to the tree. Many monks came and left the monastery, but the tradition continued. Every time the cat died, a new one was brought to continue the tradition though it had no significance to their meditation or prayer life. Centuries later, learned descendants of the monks wrote scholarly treatises about the religious significance of tying up a cat for meditation practice. (The Song of the Bird by Anthony DeMello) This story of the ritual cat points to the fact that how some religious practices started to meet some needs of the time become rituals and integral part of the religious and spiritual life even though it is irrelevant and insignificant in the present

On this 22nd Sunday of Ordinary time Jesus Christ speaks of how the oral traditions, interpretations and practices became more significant than the actual Law itself. He criticizes the religious leaders of His time for giving more emphasis to the external observances of the traditions and rituals and not on building a relationship with God and their fellow-human beings. Originally these religious traditions were intended to symbolize inner realities - outward signs of inward devotion to God's Will. Jesus was not criticizing rituals given in the Mosaic Law, but the giving of disproportionate importance to these things, while neglecting what was far more important, the love of God and the care for one's fellow-human beings. Jesus insisted that impurity came from violations of the moral law rather than violations of minute rituals. Jesus teaches that righteousness is not what we do on the outside, but who we are on the inside. Righteousness is not about the hand; it is about the heart. What makes a person holy are the attitudes and actions that St. Paul lists (Gal 5:22-23) as "the fruits" of the Spirit: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control."
