#### **From the Pastor's Desk**

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. (Isaiah. 60: 1) Beginning from the early 15th century until the middle of the 17th century, European explorers took to the seas in search of trade, knowledge, and power. The story of human exploration is as old as the story of civilization, and many of the stories of these explorers have become legends over the centuries. In History we have stories of great explorers like Marco Polo, Zheng He, Christopher Columbus, Vasco Da Gama, Pedro Álvares Cabral, Ferdinand Magellan and several others who left the security of their homeland to venture forth into strange and unknown lands which changed the course of world history and human civilization. Today on the Feast of Epiphany we remember three travelers from the first century-the Magi-who following a star, went in search of the child who was born as King of the Jews, the Messiah. They also left the security of their homeland to travel to a remote country, having nothing other than a star to show their direction. They faced the hardships and the uncertainties of their travel with the hope of discovering an immense secret-the secret of the whole universe-the secret of God's incredible love for His people. For, the Child they were looking for was no ordinary child, but the very Son of God who became man to save the world.

The Greek word Epiphanos), which means appearance or manifestation or showing forth, is used to describe Jesus' first appearance to the Gentiles. 'Epiphany' refers to God's Self-revelation as well as to the revelation of Jesus as His Son to all humankind. While in the Western Church, this feast commemorates the coming of the Magi as the first manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles, in the Eastern Church, the feast commemorates the Baptism of Christ. The angels revealed Jesus to the shepherds, and the star revealed him to the Magi. Later, God the Father revealed Jesus' identity to Israel at his Baptism in the Jordan. The Gospel passage for today teaches us how Christ enriches those who bring him their hearts. The adoration of the Magi fulfills the oracle of Isaiah in the first reading, prophesying that the nations of the world would travel to the Holy City following a brilliant light and would bring gold and incense to contribute to the worship of God. Since the Magi came with joy in their hearts to visit the Christ Child, God allowed them to see wondrous things. To experience the Messiah and the Redemption, like the Magi we must be ready to give up the securities, possessions and comforts that holds us back to the world and go in search of Jesus Christ and His teachings. To experience Jesus Christ today, with open hearts, minds and eyes let us approach the Altar where, in the Eucharistic Celebration the Epiphany of Jesus Christ happens everyday and offer ourselves on the Altar.
